


What is Summer Learning Loss?

 Many students lose about two months of grade level equivalency in reading and math skills over the summer months





What Can You Do?

- Use Your Surroundings to Build Literacy Skills
- Make Time to Read Together
- Use Online Resources to Develop New Skills
- Encourage Kids to Write Daily
- Help Your Child Build on Prior Knowledge
- Use STEM Toys to Make Learning Fun



Use Your Surroundings to Build Literacy Skills

- Label everyday objects around the house
- Labeling objects helps children learn sight words and build a stronger connection between words and the items they represent
- Point out words while in the car, at the park, out shopping, etc.



Make Time to Read Together

- Shared book reading in which an adult reads to a child and they discuss the story together can be beneficial for elementary students
- Reading together supports children's language and literacy development and is effective at promoting oral language and comprehension skills throughout elementary school
- Take regular trips to the library and pick out books together
- Set a schedule for daily reading

Encourage Children to Write Daily

- Encourage children to write in a daily journal
- They can discuss the things they are thinking about or experiencing, or can explore writing prompts that allow them to engage with certain topics
 - What is your earliest memory? Write every detail you can remember about it.
 - If you had the power to change one thing about school, what would you change and why?
 - What is the funniest thing you've ever seen?



Help Your Child Build on Prior Knowledge

- Children learn information more easily when they are able to connect that new information to something they already know
- Preview what their children will be learning the following school year and plan summer activities that will provide background knowledge to support learning

Use STEM Toys/Activities to Make Learning Fun

- Robot sets

- Science sets- color chemistry, slime, etc

Play Games that Sharpen Math Skills

Play board, card & dice games to practice math concepts



Encourage Reading

Make reading a priority by setting aside time daily & enrolling in a summer reading program at your local library



Engage in Hands-On Experiences

Daily tasks like cooking, gardening & fixing things around the house are great ways to connect & learn new skills



Be Creative
